Acts 15:35-41 The Dispute Among The Missionaries

- I. The Missionaries Continue the Work (35-36)
 - A. Paul and Barnabas Continue Serving In The Antiochian Church (35)
 - 1. They returned from the Jerusalem Council
 - 2. They began once again teaching and discipling in their home church
 - a. Paul and Barnabas weren't just wandering missionaries
 - b. Paul and Barnabas were part of the local church
 - c. They were sent from this church on their first missionary journey
 - d. They were sent from this church to the Jerusalem council
 - e. They returned to this church to preach and teach
 - B. Paul Desires To Return and Edify The New Churches (36)
 - 1. Paul's heart was to see the church thrive and grow
 - a. He didn't want to preach the gospel and then leave the churches to fend for themselves
 - b. He genuinely loved the people in those church plants and desired to see them grow in Christ
 - 2. Paul would willingly undergo the same trials as before
 - a. This shows the importance of discipleship
 - b. Paul was more than willing to go through all that again just to minister to the new churches
 - i. He and Barnabas were run out of every city they visited
 - ii. There were riots and lynch mobs in almost every city
 - iii. Paul himself was stoned to the point of death during this time
- II. The Missionaries Conflict About Their Company (37-39a)
 - A. Barnabas Desires To Take Mark (37)
 - 1. Mark left their Expedition to the Churches in Acts 13:13
 - a. We are not told why Mark left exactly
 - b. Mark returned to Jerusalem where his mother's house was
 - 2. Mark was Barnabas' Relative (see Col. 4:10)
 - a. Some say cousin, others say nephew
 - b. Perhaps Barnabas wanted his family member given another chance
 - 3. Barnabas was truly a son of encouragement
 - a. Barnabas saw potential in Mark, what he could be
 - b. Barnabas saw the same thing in Paul
 - i. When Saul came preaching the gospel the whole church was terrified of him

- ii. It was Barnabas that took him in and brought him to the Apostle Peter (Acts 9:27)
- B. Paul Refuses To Let Mark Go (38)
 - 1. Paul is still upset that Mark left them on the first journey
 - a. We aren't told why Mark left, but Paul evidently think it was a good enough reason
 - b. Paul's reasoning is that Mark shouldn't go because he was one... "who had withdrawn from them in Pamphylia and had not gone with them to the work"
 - c. Maybe the Journey was too Dangerous in Mark's eyes
 - i. They were beaten and persecuted
 - ii. They were close to being killed
 - d. Maybe Mark missed his mom in Jerusalem (probably not, but you never know)
 - 2. Paul plainly tells Barnabas that Mark isn't going
- C. A Sharp Disagreement Ensues
 - 1. This shouldn't be seen as simply a difference of opinion
 - 2. Paul and Barnabas have an intense disagreement
 - a. The imperfect tense in the verbs suggests that they disputed this point for a time
 - b. Were they shouting at each other?
 - 3. The dispute can be boiled down to the problem of whether to place the interests of the individual over the work as a whole
 - a. Paul believed it would hinder the work
 - b. Barnabas did not
- III. The Missionaries Part Company (39b-41)
 - A. Paul and Barnabas Separate From Each Other (39b)
 - 1. The disagreement was so fierce that they split up
 - 2. Remember Barnabas and Paul had been together ministering for a long time
 - 3. The disagreement was no small matter
 - 4. They split up the area of the first missionary Journey went their separate ways
 - B. Barnabas and Mark Go To Cyprus (39c)
 - 1. Barnabas was from Cyprus
 - 2. He and mark when to strengthen the churches He and Paul had founded there
 - C. Paul And Silas Go To Syria and Cilicia (40-41)
 - 1. Paul took Silas through the other areas of their journey
 - 2. Silas was one of the Jewish men sent back with Paul and Barnabas from the Jerusalem Council
 - a. He had encouraged and strengthened the brothers in Antioch (Acts 15:32)
 - b. He was also a Roman Citizen (see 16:37)
 - c. Paul calls him Silvanus in his letters (See 2 Co. 1:19; 1 Thess. 1:1; 2 Thess. 1:1)

- 3. Both Paul and Silas were also Roman Citizens
- D. God used their dispute
 - 1. Now instead of one missionary band, there are two
 - 2. We know that Paul and Barnabas would later reconcile (see 1 Co. 9:6; Col. 4:10
 - 3. Paul would come to appreciate John Mark
 - a. Paul asks Timothy to bring Mark with him when Paul was in prison because Mark was "profitable to me for ministry" (2 Ti. 4:11)
 - b. Mark later becomes and assistant to Peter (See 1 Peter 5:13)
 - c. John Mark is the author of the Gospel of Mark, which is the Gospel from Peter's testimony
