Genesis 7 – God Preserves His People Through Judgment

- I. God Prepares His People For The Coming Judgment (1-10)
 - A. God's "Seed" is Instructed For Deliverance (1-3)
 - 1. God "Sees" Noah's Righteousness (1)
 - a. Noah is Commanded to Enter the Ark
 - i. Obviously this jumps to after the ark is finished
 - Moses gives us no word as to how Noah went about the task of building the ark
 - The story isn't about Noah's ingenuity or even Noah's progress in building the ark.
 The story is about Noah's faith in God and the obedience of that faith
 - The Focus of the Text is the picture of God's salvation through Judgment and the protection of the promised "seed"
 - ii. God commands Noah to enter the ark and God will command Noah to leave the ark (8:16) God's word comes at the proper time
 - b. Noah's Righteousness is Seen By God
 - i. God "sees" Noah's righteousness is shown in opposition to God "seeing" that the whole world was filled with violence (see 6:5 & 6:12)
 - ii. Where did Noah's righteousness come from?Noah found Grace (favor) in the eyes of God notice that no works of Noah are cited
 - iii. Noah's family is brought in the ark because God saw the "righteousness" of Noah
 - 2. Noah is God's Instrument to Save Creation (2-3)
 - a. Noah Commanded to Take Seven Pairs of Unclean Animals (2a)
 - This doesn't contradict God's earlier statement about Noah bringing pairs into the ark. It is simply more specific instructions now that the time has arrived
 - ii. Seven pairs of clean animals are necessary for sacrifices that will be made to God after the flood (perhaps for Noah and family to eat?)
 - b. Noah Commanded to Take One Pair of Clean Animals (2b)
 - i. One pair of every animal is taken to continue the growth of creation after the flood
 - c. Noah Will Take The Animals To Keep Them Alive (3)
 - i. God shows grace to the creation, both clean and unclean animals will be preserved

- ii. Noah's task in taking the animals is to keep them alive through the judgment that is coming
- B. God's "Seed" Obeys God's Trustworthy Command (4-10)
 - 1. God Decrees the Judgment in Seven Days (4)
 - a. God warns Noah that the judgment will fall on the earth in seven days
 - b. In exactly seven days, there will be no escape from the devastating judgment of God (Except through the ark)
 - Notice that God does not shrink from the responsibility for the flood – He will bring the waters and he will destroy it all.
 - God's holiness and righteousness is nonnegotiable
 - ii. God will be just in his judgments. No person receives injustice from God. All deserve punishment.
 - d. 40 Days is often a period of testing or judgment in the Bible.
 - i. Moses remained on the mountain for 40 days as the people sinned at the golden calf
 - ii. The spies of Joshua spent 40 days in the land before returning and causing the people to doubt
 - iii. After sinning the people spent 40 years wandering in the wilderness
 - iv. Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness being tempted by Satan
 - 2. Noah Enters The Ark in Faith (5-10)
 - a. Noah Faithfully Obeys God (5)
 - Noah obeys God. When God says get in the ark, Noah does as he is told because he trusts that God's word is true
 - b. Noah is 600 Years Old When He Enters the Ark (6)
 - i. This means that at least one (possibly all three) of Noah's sons was 100 years old at this time (See 5:32)
 - c. Noah and All Those Commanded Enter the Ark (7-9)
 - i. Noah went in
 - ii. Noah's family went in
 - iii. All the animals went into the ark
 - God brought the animals to Adam to name
 - God now brings the animals to Noah to preserve
 - 3. God Brings the Rains in Seven Days (10)
 - a. God's word remains faithful
 - i. The rains begin exactly when he said they would

- ii. Noah and the animals are shut in before the rain begins (See vv. 13-16)
- II. God Secures is People As Judgment Begins (11-16)
 - A. The Date of God's Judgment (11a)
 - 1. The rains begin in Noah's 600^{th} year, in the second month, on the seventeenth day.
 - 2. This is important and specific we will also be told when Noah leaves the ark
 - B. The Judgment Begins to Burst Forth (11b-12)
 - 1. The Subterranean Deeps Open (11b)
 - a. The waters from beneath burst open and springs from under the earth begin to pour water forth.
 - b. The flood didn't just come from rain, water came from under the earth as well
 - 2. The Waters Also Fall From Heaven
 - 3. The Rain Continues 40 Days and 40 Nights (12)
 - a. Notice the "de-creation" language
 - b. In the beginning God separated the waters from below from the water from above here they are coming back together to form another watery grave from which a new creation will spring.
 - C. The Lord Seals His People In The Ark (13-16)
 - 1. Noah's Family Enter the Ark (13)
 - 2. The Animals Enter the Ark With Noah (14-16a)
 - 3. The Lord Closes the Door of The Ark (16b)
 - a. The Lord closes the door on the day that they entered the ark
 - b. Did they wait inside for the seven days before the rain started?
 - c. It is God who seals his remnant into the protection from judgment
 - d. The sealing of God results in either salvation (for those inside his protection) or condemnation (for those sealed outside)
 - 4. Imagine the cries of the people outside the ark when the rains began
- III. God Preserves His People Through Judgment (17-24)
 - A. The Ark Alone is Delivered From the Water (17-20)
 - 1. The Ark Rises Above The Waters (17-18)
 - a. Notice that the ark is not navigated. There is no rudder or sails
 - b. Noah is not driving the ark. He is trusting God to carry the ark according to his will.
 - c. A million things could go wrong (the ark might leak, may break apart, the animals may die, etc.) Noah is simply trusting that God is in control

- 2. The Waters Cover the Entire Earth (19-20)
 - a. The Waters Cover the High Mountains (19)
 - b. The Waters Rise 20 Feet Above the Mountain Peaks (20)
- B. God's People Alone Survive the Judgment (21-24)
 - 1. The Waters Destroy All Life on Earth (21-23a)
 - a. All Living Things on Earth Died (21-22)
 - i. Millions of animals and people die in the flood
 - ii. God has brought justice to the wickedness of creation
 - b. God Wipes The Earth Clean of Corruption (23a)
 - 2. Only God's "Seed" Survives the Judgment (23b)
 - a. Only Noah and those associated with him survived.
 - b. Only those who partake in God's exclusive salvation are delivered from the judgment
 - c. This is a representative picture and a type of the salvation that mankind has in Christ.
 - 3. The Earth Remains Flooded For 150 Days (24)
