Job Takes His Case to God (Job 13-14)

- I. Job Prepares His Case (13:1-19)
 - A. Job Decides to Complain to God (13:1-6)
 - 1. Job understands all his friends have said (1-2)
 - a. He knows what they know
 - b. He is not inferior to them
 - c. what they have said is common knowledge
 - d. Although incorrect, it is the prevailing view of God
 - 2. Job desires to bring his case before God (3)
 - a. Job is through trying to convince his friends
 - b. Job will now speak directly to the Almighty
 - 3. Job Rebukes his friends to be Silent (4-5)
 - a. He charges them with lying
 - b. He realizes they are worthless physicians
 - c. He tells them silence is their wisdom
 - 4. Job Prepares to make his case to God (6)
 - a. He cries to God to hear his argument
 - b. He cries to God to listen to his plea
 - B. Job Will Listen to Men's Words no Longer (13:7-12)
 - 1. Job will not listen to false words about God (7-8)
 - a. they have spoken deceitfully for God
 - b. They have shown partiality toward him
 - i. They blame Job because God is not unjust
 - ii. Yet Job is blameless
 - iii. Only the reader knows the full story here.
 - 2. Job warns them of God's Judgment (9-12)
 - a. They cannot deceive God when he searches them out
 - i. they have spoken falsely about God
 - ii. they will face judgment for their words
 - b. They will be rebuked and terrified (10-11)
 - c. Their maxims are worthless (12)
 - C. Job Will Trust in God's Judgment of Him (13:13-19)
 - 1. At Great Risk Job will bring his case to God (13-15)
 - a. Job decides to speak to God even though it is dangerous (13)
 - b. He understands that he is taking his life in his hand
 - c. He could rightly be killed by God for arguing with Him
 - i. Job takes the risk
 - ii. Job knows that God is his only hope
 - iii. Even if God slays him, he understands that God is his only hope
 - d. He decides to argue his ways to God's face
 - 2. Job Believes He can Come Before God (16)
 - a. He is confident he will be saved through his dispute
 - b. He is confident he is not a godless person who cannot come before God

- 3. Job is Confident that He will be Vindicated (17-19)
 - a. He has prepared his case to God carefully
 - b. He believes he shall be in the right
 - c. He understands that he risks everything
 - i. If he is found wrong (contended with 0 then he will "be silent and die"
 - ii. He is ready to risk his life
- II. Job Makes His Complaint to God (13:20-27)
 - A. Job Asks God for an Audience (20-22)
 - 1. Job asks God for two things (20)
 - 2. Job asks God to remove his sufferings (21)
 - 3. Job asks God to speak with him about his situation (22)
 - B. Job Questions the Punishment of his sin (23-26)
 - 1. Job Acknowledges His Sin (23)
 - a. He is under no delusion that he is perfect
 - b. He understands that his sin is the root cause
 - 2. Job questions God's Apparent detestation of him (24)
 - a. Job shared a relationship with God at one time
 - b. Job questions why God hides his face now
 - c. Job questions why God now considers him an enemy
 - 3. Job questions God's Faithfulness (25-26)
 - a. Job claims God is piling punishment on things already punished (25)
 - b. Job claims God is punishing him for things in his youth which were already atoned for with sacrifice
 - C. Job Charges God with Cruel Punishment (27)
 - 1. Job has been imprisoned by God
 - a. His "feet are in the stocks"
 - b. His paths are being watched as if He is under the arresting eye of God his jailer
 - D. Job Does Not Comprehend God's Ways (13:28-14:6)
 - 1. Man is too Frail for God's Relentless Discipline (13:28-14:5)
 - a. Man is just wasting away like a rotting thing (13:28)
 - b. Man's life is feeble and short (14:1-2)
 - i. Even without God's wrath, man is fading away
 - ii. Even without God's wrath, man's life is full of trouble
 - c. Man can have no hope standing before God (14:3-5)
 - i. Job wonders why God would be so concerned with man (3)
 - ii. Job knows that nothing clean can come out of something unclean (4)
 - iii. Job knows that man cannot stand in opposition to God because God has appointed his days (5)
 - Job wonders why God is taking such an hard hand with him because man's days are fleeting anyway. Job seems to

be a little sorry for himself here. "Why won't you let me alone, I'll be dead soon anyway."

- 2. Job Pleads for God to Leave Him Alone (6)
 - a. Job desires God to leave him be
 - b. Job just wants to enjoy the time he has left, even as a hired hand
- E. Job Finds No Hope in His Situation (7-12)
 - 1. Even a felled tree has hope (7-9)
 - a. At least it will sprout again (7)
 - b. Though is may "die" water will bring it to life again (8-9)
 - 2. A fallen man has no hope of restoration (10-12)
 - a. A man cannot rise again after he dies
 - b. He will remain in death until the universe dies
- F. Job Pleads for an End to His Suffering (13-17)
 - 1. Job asks for Death (13)
 - a. He wants to be hidden in Sheol (the place of the dead)
 - b. He wants to be concealed until God's wrath passes
 - c. He wants God to set a time when he will relent
 - 2. Job Longs for a Glimmer of hope (14)
 - a. He would gladly wait out the days of his service if he knew there would be a day of ease
 - b. He desires to know the day when he will be free from wrath
 - 3. Job Longs for the Covering of His Sin (15-17)
 - a. Job wishes God would "love" and watch over him again (15-16)
 - i. Of course God does love an watch over Job but he does not feel like it
 - ii. Job is longing for God's wrath to be averted
 - b. Job wishes God would forgive his iniquity (17)
 - i. Job understands his sin
 - ii. Iob desires his sin to be sealed and covered
- G. Job is Not Hopeful that God will Grant His Request (18-22)
 - 1. Job Sees the Earth's Deterioration (18-19)
 - a. The mountains crumble they don't last
 - b. The waters erode the strong rocks
 - c. The rivers eat into the soil of the earth
 - 2. Job Sees Man's hope destroyed by God's discipline (20)
 - a. In the same way the waters erode the earth
 - b. "you destroy the hope of man"
 - c. Job intimates that God wars against man forever and then man dies there is no hope
 - 3. Job despairs that man doesn't even have the hope of his sons (21)
 - 4. Job lives only in pain He has no hope God will relent
