## The Prophetic Voice Comes to Job (Job 32-33)

- I. Elihu Will Speak of God's Behalf (32:1-5)
  - A. The Three Friends Could not Convince Job (1)
    - 1. The Comforters stop trying to answer Job
    - 2. The Comforters could not convince Job of his unrighteousness
  - B. Elihu Burns with Anger for God's Righteousness (2-5)
    - 1. Elihu is angry at Job's rash words against God (2)
      - a. He was angry because Job justified himself
      - b. He was angry because Job accused God
    - 2. Elihu is angry that the comforter's failure (3)
    - 3. Elihu is angry at the whole situation (4-5)
- II. Elihu Will Speak From God's Leading (32:6-22)
  - A. God's Words are More Valuable than Traditions (6-10)
    - 1. Elihu has Deferred to the Elder men's Council (6-7)
    - 2. Elihu knows that only God's Council can change hearts (8-10)
      - a. The breath of the Almighty makes men understand (8)
      - b. The Spirit inside man must be the instrument of understanding
  - B. God's Truth is Needed to Give Answer (11-16)
    - 1. The Friends have failed in their responsibility (11-13)
      - a. None were Able to Answer Job's Words (11-12)
      - b. None can forgo his Responsibility to give answer (13)
        - i. Elihu chastises the friends saying they cannot just sit back and claim to have found wisdom
        - ii. Elihu chastises the friends saying they cannot just say "let God deal with him"
    - 2. Elihu Must Answer with God's Truth (14-16)
      - a. Elihu will not answer Job with traditional wisdom as the friends have done (14)
      - b. Elihu cannot stand by without defending God's justice (15-16)
        - i. The friends have been silenced
        - ii. Elihu cannot join them
  - C. God's Truth is Necessary to Be Heard (17-22)
    - 1. Elihu's Spirit Compels Him to Speak (17-20)
      - a. Elihu is boiling over to speak to Job
      - b. Elihu cannot hold his opinion any longer
    - 2. Elihu Must Speak for God (21-22)
      - a. Elihu will not speak to favor any man (21)
      - b. Elihu is more concerned about pleasing God
- III. Elihu Will Speak in Defense of God (33:1-13)
  - A. Elihu Pledges to Speak as God Requires (1-7)
    - 1. Elihu will speak sincerely (1-3)
      - a. Elihu begs Job to listen carefully
      - b. Elihu will speak from his heart

- 2. Elihu is a man of God just as Job (4-6)
  - a. God's Spirit is in Elihu as Job
  - b. Elihu is "toward God" just as Job
  - c. Elihu challenges Job to answer Him
- 3. Elihu wll not burden Job with more suffering (7)
- B. Elihu Pledges to Prove God has Answered Job (8-13)
  - 1. Job has claimed He is innocent (8-9)
  - 2. Job has said God has risen against him (10-11)
    - a. He says God counts him as an enemy
    - b. He says God has put his feet in stocks
  - 3. Job is wrong to say God does not answer (12-13)
- IV. Elihu Will Show God is not Silent But Speaks with Purpose (14-30)
  - A. God Continually Speaks to Man (14-22)
    - 1. God Speaks to Man Through His Conscience (14-18)
      - a. God speaks to men's hearts and warns them in their beds
      - b. God speaks to turn men from their deeds
      - c. God speaks to turn men from their pride
      - d. God speaks to keep men from perishing
    - 2. God Speaks to Man Through His Sufferings (19-22)
  - B. God Has a Purpose in His Speech (23-30)
    - 1. God Brings Man Out of Suffering (23-28)
      - a. God provides a salvation from suffering (23-25)
        - i. God gives man a mediator (23-24)
        - ii. God provides a ransom to redeem (25)
        - iii. Elihu's point is that God uses suffering to show man his goodness when he redeems him from it
      - b. Man rejoices when he is delivered (26)
        - i. When suffering comes, men pray to God
        - ii. God accepts them and restores the relationship
      - c. Man Glorifies God's Forgiveness (27-28)
        - i. Man glorifies God because he is forgiven
        - ii. Man rejoices in God's goodness
    - 2. God Allows Suffering To bring Men to Him (29-30)
      - a. God does these things continually
      - b. God does these things to redeem man and enlighten his life
- V. Elihu Challenges Job to Answer or Be Silent (31-33)
  - A. Elihu tells Job to be silent and listen
  - B. Elihu tells Job not to answer unless he can answer Elihu's words
