Treasuring Christ Above All (John 12:1-11)

- I. The Final Visit to Bethany (1-2)
 - A. Jesus Treasures the Father's Will
 - 1. The Pharisees have put the word out to arrest Jesus
 - 2. Six days before the Passover, Jesus returns to the scene of the miracle that brought down all their persecution
 - 3. No longer will he "hide" in the back country (He wasn't really hiding, he was waiting for the Father's timing
 - 4. Jesus loves the Father so much to put himself back in harm's way
 - 5. Jesus loves us enough to give his life away
 - B. Jesus is Given a Supper in Bethany (2)
 - 1. Lazarus, who was drawing attention of his own, was there
 - 2. Martha was there serving
 - a. While Mary will be the focus of this passage as she demonstrates he love for Christ, Martha should not be passed over
 - b. She treasures Christ by serving Him
 - c. This is a demonstration of love that is sorely missing in the Church today.
 - d. Love always serves Even is a person thinks they are sincere, true love for Christ results in a life of service for what Christ loves.
- II. The Evaluation of Our Treasure (3-8)
 - A. Treasuring Jesus Above All Else (3)
 - 1. Mary Anoints Jesus' Feet
 - a. She uses a pound of expensive perfume (nard)
 - b. Later Judas will estimate the value of the perfume at 300 denarii (pence).
 - i. A denarii was about a day's wage for a common laborer in the first century
 - ii. 300 days wages for a minimum wage worker in modern America would be about \$25,000. (First century people worked 12 hour days.)
 - iii. The bottle of perfume was very expensive and probably very precious to the family.
 - iv. It may have been an heirloom, or bought specifically for this occasion. Whatever the case, it was saved specifically to be poured out on Jesus.
 - c. Mary demonstrates that Christ is a greater treasure than money
 - 2. Mary Wipes His Feet With Her Hair
 - a. To wash a persons feet was the lowest of tasks

- b. Mary goes to great lengths of humility to demonstrate her love and devotion to Christ.
- c. A Jewish woman would never unbind her hair in public much less wipe someone's feet with it.
- d. A Jewish woman's hair is her honor and she laid it at Jesus' feet.
- 3. Mary's Perfume Filled the House
 - a. Imagine dumping a whole bottle of today's expensive perfume in your house.
 - b. All those in the house experience Mary's devotion to Christ. The smell of what she did would linger for a long time to come in the house for others to experience.
 - c. Our worship and devotion is a sweet savor to God and should be noticeable to others.
- 4. Mary Treasures Christ over everything
- B. Treasuring Self Above All Else (4-6)
 - 1. Judas Complains that The Perfume is Wasted (4-5)
 - a. He says the money from the perfume was worth more than Christ Himself
 - b. For Judas, the value of the perfume was wasted on Christ
 - c. The perfume should have been used for better purposes
 - 2. Judas' Complaint Stems from Selfishness (6)
 - a. Judas didn't really care about the poor
 - b. Judas only cared about lining his own pockets
 - c. Judas didn't want Jesus to get what he himself wanted
 - d. Many of us give spiritual sounding excuses when we really have selfish motivations
- C. Jesus Evaluates Their Treasure (7-8)
 - 1. Jesus Commends Mary's Love for Him (7)
 - a. He commands Judas to leave her alone
 - b. He says she has kept the perfume to anoint him for burial
 - i. She may have purchased it for that reason
 - ii. It may have been a family heirloom
 - iii. Regardless of where she got it, she saved it for this special occasion
 - iv. Maybe Mary, who had sat at Jesus' feet, understood better than others that Jesus was about to die.
 - v. She gave a great gift in honor of Him, to show her love and devotion
 - 2. Jesus Criticizes Judas' Priorities (8)
 - a. Jesus tells Judas that the poor will always be here
 - b. Jesus tells him that the Son will not always be with them.

- i. Jesus is speaking of his physical presence
- ii. He would soon die and go back to the Father
- iii. They received a particularly special gift in walking with the Son of God
- iv. He would soon be gone
- III. The Evidence of Your Treasure (9-11)
 - A. Lazarus' Life was a testimony to Christ's Power (9)
 - 1. People came not just for Jesus but to see Lazarus
 - 2. They wanted to see a resurrected man
 - 3. People should see resurrected men and women in us
 - 4. The resurrected life is proof that Christ is our treasure
 - B. Lazarus' Life Brings Persecution and Fruit (10-11)
 - 1. The priests planned to kill Lazarus too
 - a. The persecution could not stop just at Jesus
 - Lazarus had to die as well because he was proof of Iesus' work
 - c. The resurrected life brings persecution
 - 2. The people believed in Christ because of Lazarus
 - a. Lazarus' life bore fruit
 - b. The resurrected life brings forth witness and fruit as people see this new life and are brought to faith.
 - C. There is Always Evidence of What you Treasure
 - 1. You may not like the way the evidence points but it is always there
 - 2. If a space alien came to earth and observed your life 24 hours a day, what would they say is the most important thing?
 - a. Would they say that you worship a flat screen in your living room?
 - b. Would they say you worship your career?
