  - A. This punctuates Jesus' teaching about His coming
    - Injustice will abound in world / our lives
    - All will be made right
    - faith prays for justice
    - True faith doesn't lose heart
- II. The Parable of the Persistent Widow (2-5)
  - A. The People of the Parable (2-3)
    - 1. An Unrighteous Judge (2)
      - a. He did not fear God
      - b. He did not respect man
        - Summary of OT law
        - 2 Chr 19:6-7 Judges duty
    - 2. A Persistent Widow (3)
      - a. "kept coming" iterative imperfect
      - b. Desired Justice against adversary
        - Court system ruled by men
        - Widow has no kinsman to bring case
        - her continuous pleas suggest lack of resources to bribe
        - she was without means, without hope
  - B. The Power of Persistence (4-5)
    - 1. The Unrighteous Judge Refused the Widow (4)
      - a. Justice did not come for a time
        - So it is with believers
        - So it is with the World
    - 2. The Unrighteous Judge finally gives justice (5)
      - a. Her persistence bothered him
      - b. He gave in to get rid of her
- III. The Purpose of the Parable (6-8)
  - A. The Patience of God's Promise (6-7)
    - 1. The Righteous God will Hear His Children
      - a. God contrasted with the unjust judge
        - prayer doesn't "bother" God
        - Point: How much more will righteous God hear?
        - His "elect" chosen He loves them
      - b. God Will Be Patient With Them
    - 2. The Righteous God will Bring Justice (8a)
  - B. The Principle of the Parable (8b)
    - 1. Will THE faith be in Man?
      - a. THE faith points back to the woman, her kind of faith
      - b. Jesus points back to his teaching about the COMING (17:20-

37)
