God's Design For the Sabbath (Luke 6:1-11)

- I. Jesus Rejects Man's Sabbath Traditions (1-5)
 - A. The Disciples Broke the Pharisees Tradition (1-2)
 - 1. The Disciples Picked and Ate Grain on the Sabbath (1)
 - a. Over time the Jewish leaders had developed a series of thirty-nine clarifications of work, exotic legalisms, with each category capable of endless subdivision. The Mishnah explicitly listed as three of its thirty-nine categories "reaping ... threshing, winnowing" (M. Shabbath, 7.2). Jesus' disciples reaped when they "began to pick some heads of grain" and threshed and winnowed when they "rub[bed] them in their hands." And when they began to "eat the kernels," they prepared food on the Sabbath. The Pharisees were outraged—"
 - b. However, God had simply said, "Remember the Sabbath and Keep it Holy" (Ex. 20:8)
 - 2. Jesus Demonstrates the Pharisees Error (3-5)
 - a. Jesus Reminded the Pharisees about David (3-4)
 - i. The Pharisees Revered David
 - ii. David ate forbidden bread when he was starving
 - iii. The Pharisees Never faulted David
 - b. Jesus is Greater than the Sabbath (5)
 - i. God instituted the Sabbath for Man's good
 - ii. God never intended it to be slavish legalism
- II. Jesus Defies Man's Sabbath Traditions (6-11)
 - A. The Religious and the Afflicted Came on the Sabbath (6-7)
 - 1. An afflicted Man Came to hear God's Word (6)
 - a. He came knowing his need and sincere
 - 2. The Pharisees Came to Reject God's Word (7)
 - a. They refused to examine their traditions
 - b. They came to find fault in Jesus
 - B. Jesus Shuns the Pharisees Sabbath Tradition (8-11)
 - 1. Jesus Demonstrates the Pharisees Error (8-9)
 - a. Jesus brought the Afflicted Front and Center (8)
 - b. Jesus question's the Pharisees traditions (9)
 - i. God's purpose for the Sabbath was good
 - ii. Jewish sources say not doing good is doing evil
 - iii. Therefore the tradition was encouraging evil
 - 2. The Pharisees Were Furious at Jesus Action (10-11)
 - a. Jesus Healed on the Sabbath (10)
 - i. This blatantly broke their tradition
 - b. The Pharisees refused God's instruction (11)
 - i. They preferred their tradition
 - ii. They sought to deal with Jesus
